Diversity at work is a strength for Air Canada

Between June and early September, Air Canada participated in pride events in Toronto, Halifax, Vancouver, Montreal, Ottawa and Calgary. Hundreds of employees from Air Canada, Air Canada Rouge, Air Canada Vacations and Jazz marched together as one Air Canada in the parades held in each city.

Before the parade in Montreal, the pride flag was raised at the airline's Montreal headquarters, a sign of its commitment to the LGBTQ+ community and acceptance of everyone regardless of their origin, age, sexual orientation, and gender identity.
