

Air Canada celebrates arrival of first new Boeing 777 aircraft -First scheduled commercial flight: Toronto - London

MONTREAL, March 30 /CNW Telbec/ - Air Canada is introducing a new generation of aircraft into its fleet with the arrival Saturday of its first Boeing 777 in Montréal. Accompanied by Air Canada's 70-year-old Lockheed L-10A heritage aircraft, the highly-efficient, customer-friendly 777 aircraft is expected to touch down at Montreal-Pierre Elliot Trudeau International Airport in the mid-afternoon following a five-hour maiden flight from its Seattle

The new aircraft, the first of eight wide-bodied 777 aircraft being delivered to Air Canada in 2007, will begin regular international service with a flight from Toronto to London scheduled for April 6. Air Canada customers will experience the latest in-flight amenities while travelling aboard the world's most advanced widebody airliner. Air Canada's 777 fleet will operate on key long-haul routes to Europe, Asia and the South Pacific, commencing with Toronto-London in April, Toronto-Frankfurt and Toronto-Tokyo beginning in June, Vancouver-Tokyo starting in July, Toronto-Hong Kong beginning in August, and on a new Vancouver-Sydney route launching in December.

"With the arrival of the Boeing 777, we are thrilled to mark another important milestone in Air Canada's proud, 70-year history of high-quality, safe and reliable service," said Montie Brewer, President and Chief Executive Officer. "We are equally proud to be the only North American carrier to offer customers the comfort and privacy of first class lie-flat beds, at a business class price. The introduction of 777 service raises the bar in comfort and convenience in air travel while leveraging Air Canada's extensive international and North America route networks via our Toronto and Vancouver

Air Canada's 777-300ER aircraft are configured with 42 Executive First Suites and 307 seats in Economy Class, while the new 777-200LR model arriving later this year will be configured with 42 Executive First Suites and 228 seats in Economy Class. Customers will enjoy industry-leading in-flight comforts on all 18 of the new 777 aircraft that Air Canada has on order, creating a consistent fleet-wide, in-flight product in conjunction with the carrier's ongoing major refurbishment program for its existing fleet. In addition, Air Canada has 14 Boeing 787 aircraft on order that will begin delivery in 2010.

Air Canada's new in-flight product features lie-flat beds in its international Executive First cabin, the only North American airline to offer the comfort and privacy of lie-flat beds in business class. All customers will enjoy digital quality personal seatback entertainment systems with 80 hours of video and 50 hours of audio on demand, as well as standard 110 volt electrical outlets at arms reach.
